Husband-and-wife team Ben and Rachel Elwes established Ben Elwes Fine Art in 2004. Ben had worked in the international fine art market for more than 20 years, having started dealing at university, before joining Christie's in 1987. Rachel's background is in academia and museums in the US, where she was a curator at

Carnegie Museum of Art, Pittsburgh Tucked away on the first floor of an elegant 1890s building in Maddox Street, Mayfair, Ben Elwes Fine Art is exactly the kind of hidden gem waiting to be discovered by visitors to London Art Week.

↑Can you **♥remember how** you first fell in love with art? Ben As a young teenager the work that really wowed me was Veronese's gigantic 1563 painting *The Wedding at Cana* in the Louvre. It's over 30 feet long. I remember being totally captivated by this outrageous, beautiful and complicated thing. It was certainly a Damascene moment for me. Rachel Growing up in Philadelphia, I would regularly go to the Philadelphia Museum and the **Barnes Foundation** I remember doing an internship at Nantucket Historical Associates and I was completely bitten by the

bug of working directly with objects and works of art. I understood that they could be used as keys to interpreting the past, and I simply loved handling these objects and studying them up close.

→ Why do you think that art ✓galleries can sometimes intimidate people? Rachel I think it's to do with the speed of contemporary society getting to know a supplier and getting to know an object, and really enjoying that whole process. So much is now done on screens - that can be quite isolating. It's very different to the life-affirming process of learning about things before even thinking about acquiring them. Ben It's also to do with knowledge. I can totally understand that it might be intimidating to walk into an art gallery filled with pictures about which you know little. It takes time to learn. That's the great thing for us about

How would **Vyou** describe vour gallery? Rachel We've been here since the two of us joined forces in 2004. It was previously occupied by a milliner to the Queen and the Queen

arrived it was full of ostrich feathers and Ben It was the campest room in London! Rachel Now it's verv fresh and natural, with pale olue walls and pale wood floors. There is a big neo-baroque window, which means the beautiful northern light pours in. It's a really ovely space to be in.

What can visitors to the gallery expect to see in the gallery during London Art Week? **Ben** We have a varied mix of paintings, drawings, and sculpture, from the 15th century to the mid-20th century. That's typical of us - we don't specialise in one particular area. For London Art Week, we'll be showing an eight-foot-tall art deco maquette by Alfred Janniot, made in preparatior for his famous commission at the Rockefeller Centre in New York. We also have a major work by Delacroix. It's a presentation sketch of his monumental painting. Entry of the Crusaders in Constantinople, which is in the Louvre. It's not a compositional sketch, but a completed drawing that Delacroix sent to his patron King Louis-Philippe in 1838 in order to show him what he was paying for. Rachel They'll also get to meet Wilson, our new Jack Russell terrier

feast is in store for art lovers this summer. This July, 46 central London art galleries as well as three major auction houses join forces for London Art Week - a celebration of some five millennia of art and culture. On show are all manner of

beautiful objects: from the simplicity of a Phoenician axe-head dating to the third millennium BC right up to the pioneering 20th-century artists - names such as Degas. Picasso and Henry Moore. London Art Week takes place

on 1-8 July across Mayfair and St James's, one of London's most enchanting areas and a major centre of the art world - for artists, collectors, art connoisseurs and dealers - for well over 250 years. In fact, the West End of London is home to one of the oldest commercia galleries in the world: Colnaghi, which was established by an Italian firework manufacturer back in 1760. Today, the area is highly regarded

quality of the works of art on show. But despite this prestige and history not everybody knows about it. This is where London Art Week comes in One of the major aims of the event's organisers is to encourage visitors who might not normally venture inside the prestigious art galleries of central London

highlight is a triptych of delicate drawings in pen and ink by the 16th-century Flemish artist Hans Bol. London Art Week was conceived by art dealers such as Riley-Smith and it is still run by them too. The event is a collaborative partnership between the galleries and auction houses of

Mayfair and St James's.

Its launch in 2013 brought together at Moretti Fine Art two older initiatives - Master

Drawings and Sculpture Week (established in 2001) and Master Paintings Week (2009). By uniting in this way, London Art Week showcases the tremendous breadth of the area's art scene and provides a mouth-watering array of attractions for art-loving visitors, serious collectors and buyers

Many galleries organise displays and exhibitions especially for London Art Week. But the event is not just about London: dealers come from as far afield as France, Italy, Spain and the US to showcase their wares.

In 2015, representatives came from more than 50 international museums as well as visitors from all over the world. Sales – to both private clients and international institutions - topped the £1 million mark.

This year there are newcomers such as Lullo.Pampoulides and Kallos

Gallery exhibiting alongside stalwarts Mayfair and St James's grand facades. Dealers are

such as Johnny Van Haeften. Richard Green and Agnew's. In Cork Street, Lullo.Pampoulides has timed its launch to coincide with London Art with Classicism Reimagined: Master

Paintings and Sculpture 1700-c1950. One of the most exciting parts of London Art Week is the opportunity to meet the experts face-to-face. Art dealers "play a major role as mediators | Crown Estate, which owns nearly to make great art accessible to all", savs Dr Xavier Bray, of Dulwich Picture Gallery. Few things bring works of art alive more than speaking

to those who know and love them. Many of the galleries are major global names with prominent streetfacing spaces. But others are dealers unknown to those outside the field. Some operate from upstairs showrooms hidden away behind

Here you can see amazing works of art and talk to the experts in intimate surroundings. It is a very different experience to viewing such Week, and is opening its doors in style works in a major museum or even at an art fair. Wandering from gallery to gallery is an opportunity not only to see great works of art but to experience this beautiful area of the capital. The event is sponsored by the 50 per cent of St James's and is currently implementing a major £500 million investment programme

to develop the area and increase the number of galleries. "Art is integral to St James's," says Anthea Harries, portfolio manager St James's London, the Crown Estate "Through sensitive regeneration we will be able to offer more galleries the chance to move into the area.
